

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

1991 has been a challenging and eventful year. Through hardwork and determination we have done our best to serve the Association and Community. To do this we had to seek opportunity, capitalise on situations offered, and muster the support of as many people as possible to see our projects through.

1. MANAGEMENT REPORT

1.1 COMMITTEE MEETINGS

Sixteen Management Committee Meetings were held during the period under review. Six of these were held at the Board Room, Singapore Recreation Club (SRC), courtesy of the President and Committee, SRC. The rest were held at the homes of the various members.

Sub-Committee Meetings were held at the homes of the chairmen and members of these committees as and when the need arose.

1.2 ADMINISTRATION

The Association continued to use the firm of M/s Emmanuel & Barker as its official address. The assistance of its secretary in taking telephone and other messages was also made available to the Association. These services were rendered at no charge to the Association.

Ms Carla Barker (Life Member), continued to advise the Association on legal and constitutional matters in her capacity as legal adviser.

1.3 CO-OPTED MEMBERS

Mr Burton Westerhout consented to co-option onto the Management Committee in October 1991 and has since functioned as a member of the Committee.

1.4 EX-OFFICIO MEMBERS

The President and Vice-President were ex-officio members of all sub-committees.

1.5 RESIGNATIONS

Mr James Klass, Committee Member, resigned in September 1991 due to the heavy pressure of work in his capacity as National Coordinator in the Marriage Encounter Movement.

Mr Edwin Thompson, Vice-President, resigned in November 1991 for personal reasons.

The Management Committee accepted both resignations with deep regret.

1.6 APPOINTMENT OF VICE-PRESIDENT

Mr Gerald Pereira, Honorary Secretary, was appointed the Vice-President by the Management Committee in December 1991.

1.7 SPECIAL TRIBUTE

As Vice-President of the Association, **Mr Edwin Thompson** contributed substantially in getting the Association recognised as a credible marshalling body for Eurasian efforts. Mr Thompson established a network of links with government ministries, ethnic associations and Eurasian associations overseas and was instrumental in obtaining the goodwill and support of the press. He was mainly responsible for the move to allow the Association's members the use of SRC facilities so that our members would have some form of "Club" meeting point in future. The Association's involvement in Community Month, organised by the Ministry of Community Development was also coordinated by Mr Thompson. To all the projects in which the Association has been involved, Mr Thompson has given his complete support and the benefit of his wide experience.

Although **Mr James Klass** served on Committee for a short while, his service to the Association goes further back. He contributed significantly to the evolution of the plans and projects of the present Management Committee and has assured the Association that his expertise is at our disposal.

The total sum disbursed was \$4450/-.

2.1.2 Forums & Workshops

150 parents, grandparents and young adults attended a Forum on "How to make your child successful" organised by the Education Sub-Committee on 26 May, 1991 at St Patrick's School Hall. All ethnic organisations were invited and the forum was open to the public. Valuable advice was given on good parenting and a lively and informative discussion followed. A study skills note book was available. Mr Rudy Mosbergen (ex-principal, Raffles Junior College) chaired the forum. The panel comprised Ms Vilma de Rozario (Lecturer, Institute of Education), Brother Joseph McNally (Principal, La Salle College of Art) and Mrs Ursula Quah (Assistant Director, Secondary Schools, Ministry of Education). The keynote speaker was Mr Anthony Yeo (Director, Counselling Services).

A workshop to prepare students sitting for the 'O' Level English and Literature examinations was conducted by Mrs Eve Rodrigues on 7 September, 1991. The 20 participants who attended received valuable tips on the English Papers I & II. Mrs Rodrigues also dealt extensively with the three set Literature texts. The Straits Times report on the workshop gave a detailed summary of the tips given by Mrs Rodrigues on how to study Literature.

2.1.3 **Education Hotline**

An Education Hotline was established to assist students and parents in matters pertaining to the choice of schools, subject combinations, syllabus requirements and other such matters. Students could also seek advice and counselling on homework and other education matters. So far the Hotline has met with modest success but it is hoped that more will avail themselves of this on-going service.

2.1.4 **Tuition Scheme**

To date 11 children have received tuition under this scheme. The Education Sub-Committee faces problems of matching students with available volunteer tutors within the constraints of time and distance. This problem could be solved if more teachers volunteered their services and parents were more flexible in accommodating the available tutors.

2.1.5 **On-the-Spot Art Competition**

An On-the-Spot Art Competition on the theme of "The Singapore I Love" was held at the National Museum in conjunction with Eurasian Heritage Day. The response was very encouraging, there being a total of twenty-four entries. Participants were supplied with drawing materials if required and appeared to have enjoyed themselves immensely. The Sub-Committee feels that this activity should be organised at future functions.

2.1.6 **Visits to NUS and the Polytechnics.**

The infrastructure for visits to these institutions has been set up. Group visits will continue to be advertised through flyers and in the EA News and visits will be arranged if there is sufficient response.

The Education Sub-Committee is optimistic that the members will demonstrate their interest in the education of their children.

2.2 **FINANCE**

Chairman: Colin Meyer

The Finance Sub-Committee policy reflects that of the incumbent Management Committee to manage the activities of the Association on a sound financial footing. This means that each activity is organised, wherever possible, on a self-financing basis. In those instances where it is not possible to do so, costs are kept to the minimum.

2.2.1 **Accumulated Funds**

In 1991, these funds increased by 8.2% over 1990, represented substantially by funds in fixed deposits, bank balances and accounts receivable. The majority of the Accounts Receivable settled their outstanding in 1992.

2.2.2 **Members Subscriptions {\$9,541 (1990 - \$16,713)}**

The drop in subscriptions received in 1991 is due to a fall in the number of new life members - 108 in 1991 compared to 244 in 1990. Besides, there was a substantial number of ordinary and associate members whose subscriptions were in arrears, some even going back to 1990 and 1989. Every effort is being made by the Membership Sub-Committee to collect these subscriptions. Members have been reminded to pay their subscriptions in the EA News and in flyers. So far, the Membership Sub-Committee has been fairly successful. However these arrears were mostly paid in the first three months of 1992 and are consequently not reflected in the Statement of Income and Expenditure for the year ending 31 December, 1991.

2.2.3 **Income**

The Association's income was derived from members subscriptions and social activities and advertisements. Although the primary objective of most of the social activities was not to raise funds but to serve the needs of members, income was derived from some of them, namely Noite Euroisiana, National Day Charity Ball, New Year's Eve Ball and Eurasian Heritage Day. In addition, advertisements in three souvenir programmes and the sale of tee shirts and recipe cards also generated income for the Association. Many donations were also received from members both in cash and kind and in services rendered.

Mention must be made of the strenuous efforts made to raise funds and the kind assistance to the Treasurer of Burton Westerhout, Ernest Marsh, Duncan Trollope and Edmund See.

2.2.4 **Donations**

The Association showed that it was a donor as well as a recipient in 1991. A cheque for \$45,836.65 was presented to St Joseph's Home for the Aged, this being the amount raised at the National Day Charity Ball organised by the Association.

A donation of \$1000/- was made to the Lee Kuan Yew Scholarship Fund and another donation of \$1000/- to St Patrick's School Building Fund.

Some of the income raised also went towards the Eurasian Book Project.

2.2.5 **Auditors**

The Association is grateful to Alwyn Lim (Associate Member) of Alwyn Lim and Co. for kindly auditing the accounts.

Games continues to be the binding force which brings members together on a regular basis. Weekly Saturday games activities continued to be held at St Patrick's School until October 1991. The soccer field, tennis courts, squash courts, and badminton courts were leased to the Association.

Saturday games activities were temporarily suspended in November and December for regular field maintenance. However these activities could not be resumed in the new year as St Patrick's would be undergoing major re-building and the school authorities were unwilling to lease out its facilities.

A number of alternative locations were examined and evaluated. In view of the fact that 60% of the Association's members live in districts 15, 16, and 18, the same facilities were leased from Tampines Junior College. From 1 February 1992, Games resumed every Saturday at this location.

2.3.1 Soccer

Soccer has proved to be the most popular game with good attendance of players and supporters. The Junior, Youth and Senior Teams were coached by Richard Koek, Fred Fox and Vernon Lim respectively.

To complement the weekly training sessions of the teams, a number of friendly matches were organised.

2.3.2 Netball

Netball continued to gain popularity with a gradual increase in attendance during the year. The Netball Team was coached by Maureen Westerhout and Joyce Lim. A number of friendly matches against other teams were also played.

2.3.3 Raquet Games

Tennis, badminton and squash, though not as popular as netball and soccer, did see a number of regulars every Saturday. These games were more often played on a social basis. Patrick Branson was on hand to share his expertise.

2.3.4 Trips to Malaysia

Ernest Marsh organised a trip to Penang for the Youth Soccer Team from 17 - 22 June 1991. They played 2 matches but despite good performances, lost both. The Association subsidised the trip.

Vernon Lim organised a trip to Kuala Lumpur for the Senior Soccer Team and the Netball Team from 22 - 24 June 1991. The two soccer matches ended in draws while the ladies won one and lost one of the netball matches.

During both these trips, contact was made with Eurasian associations there.

2.3.5 Games with the Vietnamese

In April 1991, EA played host to a Vietnamese team from Hawkins Road Camp. Two soccer matches were played and EA lost both. After the matches visitors and members enjoyed light refreshments.

2.4 MEMBERSHIP

Besides providing general support to other Sub-Committees and projects through the provision of the mailing lists the aim of the Membership Sub-Committee is to maintain an up-to-date data base of the Association's membership and to recruit new members. In addition this Sub-Committee assists the Treasurer in the despatch of membership receipts and the collection of subscriptions.

2.4.1 Membership Status

Two applications for Life Membership were not approved. One was from a Eurasian Non-citizen and the other from a Filipino.

2.4.2 Members in Arrears

Ordinary and Associate members were found to be in arrears, some from as far back as 1989. Efforts to recover these arrears through reminders in the EA News and in flyers have met with some success. Ordinary members were given the option to convert to Life Membership once they had settled their arrears and some took the option to do so.

2.4.3 Unrecorded Members

In the process of bringing membership records up-to date, it was discovered that the Association had no record of the membership of some people who declared themselves to have been Life members. As these were generally senior members of the Eurasian community, the Management Committee agreed to recognise these members and re-instate them with no additional subscription. Besides the goodwill this generated, an extra benefit of this move was that their families were then recruited as Life Members too.

2.4.4 Recruitment

The Membership Sub-Committee took the opportunity to set up a Membership Booth at every one of the Association's functions. This excited the interest of members and non-members alike and forms were taken. This was especially successful on Eurasian Heritage Day as 600 membership forms were given out. Although this has resulted in a trickle rather than a flood of membership applications, at least an awareness of the Association's existence has been created.

2.4.5 Assistance to other Sub-Committees

This Sub-Committee assisted the other Sub-Committees by providing a data base of target groups, for example a list of Youth members for Youth activities, and by providing the mailing labels for the EA News and flyers.

2.4.6 Equipment

The work of the Membership Sub-Committee was greatly facilitated with the purchase by the Association of a computer and printer and relevant software packages. Members can now be assured that their membership records are up-to-date. The equipment is also available for use by the other Sub-Committees.

2.5 PUBLIC RELATIONS

The main thrust of the Public Relations programme is to build upon the relationship which the Association enjoys with government, the press, other ethnic organisations and Eurasian associations overseas to project the image and identity of the Association.

2.5.1 Community Projects

Kevin Shepherdson, one of our younger members, represented the the Association on a Straits Times forum on First Time Voters.

The Association was also approached to assist SBC in their Christmas production, Scrooge at Christmas. Christopher Carvalho and Vernon Cornelius took part.

World War II veteran, Cleaver Eber, was part of the series on the World War II featured in the Straits Times.

Val Scully and three of our youth members put together a programme at the request of Jenan Play Centre to create an awareness of Eurasian heritage and culture.

The Association was also called on for its opinion on matters concerning Eurasians by various government bodies and other organisations.

2.5.2 Media Coverage

The English, Chinese, Malay and Tamil press all gave extensive coverage to the Education Forum and Eurasian Heritage Day. Straits Times ran a three page feature in the Life Section on Eurasians, besides a report on Eurasian Heritage Day and articles on the dancers and the book on Eurasians. In terms of space in the newspapers, the Association has never before enjoyed such favourable publicity.

Eurasian Heritage Day was also featured on the news on television and Irene Rodrigues and co-ordinator Judith Arul were both featured in separate interviews on radio.

2.5.3 Dissemination of Information

The local media, ethnic organisations and clubs, as well as Eurasian associations overseas, were all kept well informed of the Association's activities through the EA News, flyers and promotional materials that were sent to them.

2.6 PUBLICATIONS

2.6.1 **EA News**

Three copies of the EA News were published in April, July and October, 1991. In addition, a Eurasian Heritage Day Special Issue, incorporating Christmas greetings was sent to members in December. Although the Publications Sub-Committee is a small one, they were greatly assisted by the contributions of members of reports and photographs of the Association's functions. Members also wrote in with their own news and views and these were incorporated so that the newsletter has become truly representative of the Association.

2.6.2 **Souvenir Programmes**

Souvenir Programmes were also produced for the National Day Charity Ball, Eurasian Heritage Day and New Year's Eve, 1991 Gala Dinner & Dance. All these programmes contained feature articles of interest to the Eurasian community besides the programme and advertisements. These souvenir programmes have proved so popular that requests for them have even come from people who did not attend the event. The advertisements in these programmes raised a substantial amount of income for the Association.

2.6.3 **Flyers**

Several flyers were produced by the various Sub-Committees to inform members of coming events. The distribution of these flyers was the responsibility of the Publications Sub-Committee and done either with the EA News or on their own.

2.6.4 **Packing & Posting**

The sorting and packing of the newsletters and flyers was done by Youth members at a cost of 10 cents per envelope. This compared favourably with the commercial charge of 30 cents. However, cost of postage has increased and the Association sometimes had to pay as much as 40 cents per mailing exercise. It would greatly reduce costs if members would agree to the distribution of one package per household.

2.6.5 **Annual Report**

The Publications Sub-Committee has also been responsible for the publication of this Annual Report.

2.7 **SOCIAL**

The role of the Social Sub-Committee is the organisation of the social functions for the enjoyment of the Association's members and the support of EA activities through the provision of refreshments. The members of this Sub-Committee are recruited on an ad hoc basis under the chairmanship of Kathleen Woodford.

2.7.1 Noite Eurosiana

Noite Eurosiana was held on 8 June, 1991, at the Singapore Swimming Club. 320 members and their families attended what has become a fixture on the Association's calendar. Tickets were priced at \$35 and music was provided by the Klansmen and a mobile disco. Our special guests were the President of SRC, Mr Johnny Goh and his wife and twenty Senior Citizens from the Little Sisters of the Poor Home for the Aged. Mention must be made of the sterling service rendered by Joyce de Silva and Jenarra Lau.

2.7.2 New Year's Eve Ball, 1991

The Association's Annual New Year's Eve Ball was held at the Meridien Hotel. The 350 tickets at \$90/- were rapidly sold out and regretfully the venue could not hold more. In fact, the search for a large enough venue each year is a problem. Again music was provided by the Klansmen and the two Richmonds, Brian and Mark kept the crowd entertained with their mobile disco and their services as MCs.

2.7.3 Thank You Parties

Two Thank You Parties were held by the Association in appreciation of the services rendered by members and others. The first was for all those who took part in the National Day Parade 1991. The Association also took the opportunity to present the Education Bursaries and Merit Awards on the same evening. The second Thank You Party was held for all those who actually helped on Eurasian Heritage Day itself. Although the Association would have liked to have invited all who contributed in any way at all, the numbers were just too large. Both parties were held at the SRC.

2.7.4 Support of EA Activities

The Social Sub-Committee were a very important part of other EA functions as they provided the refreshments for them.

The largest effort was for Eurasian Heritage Day when donations of over 2000 portions of food were sold.

On 13 April, 1991, the Games Sub-Committee entertained the Vietnamese from Hawkins Camp to a friendly football match. Generous donations of cakes, mee, curry puffs, samoosas and drinks were made by our members. Special thanks must go to the ladies, Ivy de Souza, Martha Holmberg, Dulcie Plunkett, Daisy Yeong, Ivy Bohn, Tilly Woodford, Corinne Woodford, Doreen Barth and Val Scully who gave up their precious time to donate and make sandwiches.

These same ladies again gave of their services in providing the refreshments for the reception which followed the Education Forum. Several members donated dishes for which they are justly famous.

The Sub-Committee also assisted in obtaining food for the stall set up for Senior Citizen's Day at the Toa Payoh Stadium.

2.8 WELFARE

There were no cases which required welfare assistance during the year. However, one case was handled by the Education Sub-Committee as it was a matter involving education.

The Youth Sub-Committee aims to provide activities of special interest to the Youth members of the Association. It also aims to act as a training ground for future leaders of the community. It is for this reason that the MC member functions in the capacity of an adviser, rather than a Chairman of this Sub-Committee.

2.9.1 **Trekking**

The annual youth tea dance was held on 8 September, 1991 at the Chinoiserie, Hyatt Hotel. 81 people attended. This was a completely youth run activity.

2.9.3 **Outward Bound**

The Association has liaised with the Outward Bound School on Pulau Ubin to provide places on their Leadership and Character Development Courses for EA youth. 2 places were offered on the December 1991 course but there were no takers. 3 youths will attend this course during the March 1992 school holidays.

2.9.4 **Involvement in EA Activities**

The Youth members have also been fully involved in all other EA activities. The Junior Soccer Team and the Soccerroos are a well established part of the Games programme. Under the leadership of Scott Arul, they organised the Children's Playground at Eurasian Heritage Day. Many youths assisted their parents in running various other activities on that day too.

The Education Sub-Committee has run activities which are particularly relevant to the youth. They are also an important component of the EA Dancers and have contributed to the newsletter as well.

Although there is a lot of scope for youth activities, the Association experiences some difficulty in getting the youths to come forward spontaneously. A lot of persuading and cajoling is necessary. However, the contact with the youth is one of the most worthwhile activities and the Association will continue to promote these activities. The Association will also continue to promote family togetherness in activities which draw youths, adults and senior citizens together.

3. NATIONAL EVENTS

The Association, as representative of the Eurasian community in Singapore, was invited to participate in several national events.

3.1 NATIONAL DAY PARADE

For the second consecutive year, the Association participated in the National Day Parade. This year our contingent of 40 was a component of the 1100 Singaporeans who took part in the People's Association Mass Display item, "Exuberance". Maurice Sheares was co-ordinator for the EA contingent. After months of long and arduous training, our group of dancers and supporters performed proudly at the National Stadium as representatives of the community. Their tremendous effort is greatly appreciated.

A Thank You Party was held on 25 September, 1991 for the contingent and their guests. Participants received a souvenir photograph, a memento and the official National Day 1991 Certificate of Participation. Mr Tay Teck Keng, Deputy Director (Field) from the People's Association was present and it was obvious that the members of the contingent had become great friends with him.

3.2 NATIONAL DAY CHARITY BALL

Some 600 people, EA members and their friends, helped to raise S45,836.65 for the St Joseph's Home for the Aged at the Association's National Day Charity Ball on 24 August, 1991. Ten members of the Home attended the dinner. The Guest-of-Honour, Dr Seet Ai Mee, the then Minister for Community Development, spoke of the need for ethnic associations to look beyond their own community and reach out to all Singaporeans. Also present was Dr Ee Peng Liang who is well known for his involvement in fund raising for charity. The donation would go towards the purchase of special beds which would be most appreciated by the bedridden aged.

3.3 NATIONAL TRIBUTE DINNER

The Association was represented on the Organising Committee by the EA President. The National Tribute Dinner in honour of Senior Minister, Mr Lee Kuan Yew, took place on 4 October, 1991. The Association was represented by 60 members and friends. The late Mr Stanley Stewart, a personal friend of the Senior Minister, and who had also worked with him, represented the Eurasians at the main table.

3.4 THE LEE KUAN YEW SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The Association responded to the request to participate in the Fund which was launched at the Tribute Dinner with a donation of S1,000/-.

3.5 COMMUNITY MONTH

Community Month, organised by the Ministry of Community Development in November 1991, was fully supported by the Association. Denis Augustin, a teacher, represented the Association at the public seminar on Family Life on 3 November, 1991. The Association's Song and Dance Troupe performed at the Family Day Carnival and Picnic at the East Coast on 10 November, 1991, and the Association set up a stall selling Eurasian cakes and sandwiches at the Senior Citizen's Carnival held at the Toa Payoh Stadium on 17 November 1991.

3.6 IPS CLOSED DOOR FORUM ON EDUCATION TRENDS

Mr Rudy Mosbergen, a well known educationist, and the EA President represented the Association at the above forum organised by the Institute of Policy Studies.

3.7 EDINBURGH TATTOO

The Association provided the costumes for the Eurasian representation in the colourful Edinburgh Tattoo held in Scotland in August 1991. Youth leader, Jason de Hamel was part of the Singapore contingent whose item reflected the nation's multi-racial, multi-cultural diversity.

3.8 PRIME MINISTER'S CHINESE NEW YEAR GARDEN PARTY

The Association was represented by its President and Vice-President/Secretary at the Prime Minister's Chinese New Year Garden Party held at the Istana on 15 February, 1992.

3.9 SINGAPORE FESTIVAL OF ARTS, 1992

The Association has been invited to take part in the Festival Fringe. We have been asked to showcase the Eurasians at a Fringe event which will be held on Orchard Road and which will include the other ethnic groups.

4. CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER ETHNIC ASSOCIATIONS

The Chinese, Malay and Indian ethnic bodies were all invited to participate in the various EA functions. In addition the Association represented the Eurasians on several occasions.

4.1 PERANAKAN ASSOCIATION

The President represented the Association at a dinner celebrating the 91st anniversary of the Peranakan Association.

4.2 HONG BAO RIVER SPECIAL

The Management Committee was invited to the launch of the Ministry of Community Development documentary on Chinese customs and traditions. The Committee members and their families attended the Chinese New Year show organised by the Singapore Federation of Chinese Clan Associations on 2 February, 1992.

5. MEMBERSHIP IN GOVERNMENT SPONSORED BODIES

The Association has been invited to join some of the government sponsored organisations. This indicates that the Association is being recognised as representing the Eurasian community in Singapore.

5.1 NATIONAL ARTS COUNCIL

The Association was granted membership of the National Arts Council through the auspices of the Ministry of Information and the Arts. Membership entitles the Association to apply for tax exemption on donations for any activity involving the promotion of the arts and culture. So far the Association has obtained tax exemption on donations for Eurasian Heritage Day and the Eurasian Book Project.

5.2 CORPORATE MEMBERSHIP OF PEOPLE'S ASSOCIATION

Through the Association's involvement in the People's Association contingent for the 1991 National Day Parade, we have developed very good relations with the PA and have applied for corporate membership. PA has extensive facilities which corporate members can enjoy. Its activities provide a whole range of opportunities for interaction with the other ethnic groups who are already corporate members. Corporate membership is free and the outcome of the Association's application will be known in May 1992.

5.3 NATIONAL COMMUNITIES ORGANISATION COUNCIL

The Ministry of Community Development has indicated that the Association will be invited to join the National Communities Organisation Council in July 1992 when the next year of office of the council commences.

2.7.1 **Noite Eurosiana**

Noite Eurosiana was held on 8 June, 1991, at the Singapore Swimming Club. 320 members and their families attended what has become a fixture on the Association's calendar. Tickets were priced at \$35 and music was provided by the Klansmen and a mobile disco. Our special guests were the President of SRC, Mr Johnny Goh and his wife and twenty Senior Citizens from the Little Sisters of the Poor Home for the Aged. Mention must be made of the sterling service rendered by Joyce de Silva and Jenarra Lau.

2.7.2 **New Year's Eve Ball, 1991**

The Association's Annual New Year's Eve Ball was held at the Meridien Hotel. The 350 tickets at \$90/- were rapidly sold out and regretfully the venue could not hold more. In fact, the search for a large enough venue each year is a problem. Again music was provided by the Klansmen and the two Richmonds, Brian and Mark kept the crowd entertained with their mobile disco and their services as MCs.

2.7.3 **Thank You Parties**

Two Thank You Parties were held by the Association in appreciation of the services rendered by members and others. The first was for all those who took part in the National Day Parade 1991. The Association also took the opportunity to present the Education Bursaries and Merit Awards on the same evening. The second Thank You Party was held for all those who actually helped on Eurasian Heritage Day itself. Although the Association would have liked to have invited all who contributed in any way at all, the numbers were just too large. Both parties were held at the SRC.

2.7.4 **Support of EA Activities**

The Social Sub-Committee were a very important part of other EA functions as they provided the refreshments for them.

The largest effort was for Eurasian Heritage Day when donations of over 2000 portions of food were sold.

On 13 April, 1991, the Games Sub-Committee entertained the Vietnamese from Hawkins Camp to a friendly football match. Generous donations of cakes, mee, curry puffs, samoosas and drinks were made by our members. Special thanks must go to the ladies, Ivy de Souza, Martha Holmberg, Dulcie Plunkett, Daisy Yeong, Ivy Bohn, Tilly Woodford, Corinne Woodford, Doreen Barth and Val Scully who gave up their precious time to donate and make sandwiches.

These same ladies again gave of their services in providing the refreshments for the reception which followed the Education Forum. Several members donated dishes for which they are justly famous.

The Sub-Committee also assisted in obtaining food for the stall set up for Senior Citizen's Day at the Toa Payoh Stadium.

2.8 **WELFARE**

There were no cases which required welfare assistance during the year. However, one case was handled by the Education Sub-Committee as it was a matter involving education.

The first ever, Eurasian Heritage Day was held on 3 November 1991 at the National Museum. This day succeeded in increasing and enhancing the national consciousness of Singaporeans of the Eurasian Community - who they are, where they come from, their customs and traditions, their food, their dances, songs, games and most of all the spirit that is distinctly Eurasian. The interest this event aroused could be seen by the amount of coverage it received in all the media both before and after the event. The occasion was graced by the presence of BG George Yeo, Minister for Information and the Arts and Second Minister for Foreign Affairs, as Guest of Honour. Mr Zulkifli Mohamed, President of Majlis Pusat, and officials from the MCD were present at the opening.

Eurasian Heritage Day provided the opportunity for more than 300 people, Eurasians and non-Eurasians, members and non-members alike to come together to work for the community. It is a tribute to the great goodwill of these people that the day was a resounding success. The Association is also grateful to Fraser & Neave who sponsored the event and the several other companies who donated services and equipment.

Although 2000 portions of food and sufficient cakes and sandwiches for 800 people were prepared, we ran out of food. This is not surprising in view of the fact that 8000 people (according to Museum estimates) came and stayed to enjoy the other aspects of Eurasian heritage. The heart of Eurasian Heritage Day was the Eurasian Legacy Exhibition held in the Rotunda. A head count of the crowd entering the display area through the front entrance in one direction only was 4742.

The logo, designed by Rita Leicester, of individual strands of our varied ancestry woven together to form the Eurasian fabric, caught the imagination of many and was repeated as a motif on T-Shirts which were sold on that day. A set of Recipe Cards entitled "The Eurasian Flavour" was also produced in conjunction with Eurasian Heritage Day. Both these items have proved very popular at home and abroad and are still available.

The pre-publication sales of the book, "Singapore Eurasians - Memories and Hopes" was launched on the same day. There were 276 orders placed.

Eurasian Heritage Day raised \$30 000 for the Association. However the pride it has generated in being Eurasian is beyond measure.

6.4 **RESOURCE PANEL**

A huge Resource Panel has been generated this year through activities like the Education Seminar, the Charity Ball and Eurasian Heritage Day. EA members and Eurasians in general came forward with their special expertise to contribute towards particular activities.

6.5 **CONSTITUTION REVIEW**

Much work on the raising of the bye-laws for the Associations Constitution has been done by the Sub-Committee. Bye-laws for AGM proceedings and financial management have been produced.

6.6 **CLUBHOUSE**

Efforts were continued throughout the year under review to secure a suitable and economically viable clubhouse. The Commissioner of Lands was formally approached for assistance and the EA has been placed on the mailing list for vacant Government premises publicly offered for tender. So far none has been found to be suitable.

The Association has reached an understanding with SRC to admit Life and Ordinary members as 'visiting' or 'paying' members and Junior Members as 'discounted junior members'. The intention is to pursue this preliminary agreement further as a long-term affiliation arrangement.

However the search for a home for the Association continues.

The song troupe made up of 14 singers led by Gerry Pereira include in their ever-expanding repertoire Portuguese, Spanish and English songs. A welcome addition has been Thomas Paul and his clarinet. The singers proved to be great favourites when they performed on Eurasian Heritage Day, at the National Day Charity Ball, Little Sisters of the Poor Fun Fair, the Children's Christmas Treat, the National Family Day Picnic and at the New Year's Eve Ball.

The Song and Dance Troupe are gradually becoming more well-known. The Association has had a request for them to perform (for a fee) at the National University of Singapore Eurasian Night on 3 April 1992.

The Annual Christmas Treat was held on 14 December 1991 at St Patrick's School. 100 children attended and enjoyed the Fancy Dress Competition, games, food and drink. Members' children were charged \$10/-. while non-members' children paid the full price of \$20/-.

The Fair also included food and drink stalls for parents. Some of the food on sale was generously donated by members.

The intention of the Christmas Treat was to provide an occasion for children to celebrate Christmas. However, with careful planning and donations, the Christmas Treat saw a net profit of \$138.55.

6.11 **EVERGREENS PROGRAMME**

Our intention with the Evergreens Programme is not to isolate them as a separate group but to keep them well integrated with the main body and younger members of the Association. Therefore, we have taken care to make special provision for the Evergreens at EA functions and in EA activities.

Although most of these have already been described under their respective reports, it may be useful to summarise them all here.

The EA raised funds specifically for the St Joseph's Home for the Aged with its National Day Charity Ball.

Eurasian Heritage Day provided the Evergreens most opportunity for participation and interaction. A special preview of the Eurasian Legacy Exhibition and meeting with BG George Yeo was arranged and co-ordinated by that very active Evergreen himself, Bill Plunkett. Our senior members took the opportunity to sing the old songs and dance the old dances, displaying an energy that would put many a youngster to shame. There was also story-telling of bygone days by grandmother Irene Rodrigues.

The Association was very touched to see that many old folk had come from the Homes for the day just to meet with old friends and share their memories with younger Eurasians. The youngest participant at Eurasian Heritage Day was a 6 year old dancer and the oldest was 79 year old Albert Pereira who belted out "You are My Sunshine".

The Song Troupe boasts several Evergreens whose love for Singing has not stopped them from travelling great distances to turn up for practices and performances. The Song Troupe have also performed for the aged at the Little Sisters of the Poor.

Gerry Pereira who is in charge of the EA Singers is also organising the participation of senior members of EA in the Veteran's Athletic Meet to be held in June 1992.

While there are always, several of our Evergreens taking an active part in the Association's social function, we also have those who are less able to do so. We have been able to invite the old folk from the homes to Noite Euroisiana due to the generosity of members.

In a less formal way our Evergreens are always included by their families in the Association's activities. One example was May Frois who accompanied her grandchildren to every National Day Parade rehearsal in Kallang, in the bus, all the way from Bukit Batok.





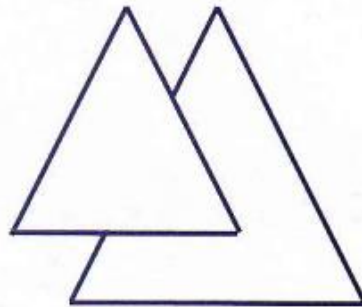
Natural honey is recommended for sore throats, fever, clearing of bowels, asthma, chronic headaches and stomach disorders.

A full teaspoon or two is recommended.



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
