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



If you were home and on social media during the lead up to Christmas, you might have caught the EA's Home For Christmas series aired on its Facebook page on 17 and 23 December.



Sky's the limit for EURASIAN YOUNG LIONS



Football fans from the local Eurasian community were in for a pleasant surprise in the second-half of last year when the Football Association of Singapore announced its men's squad for the Asian Football Confederation (AFC) Under-23 Asian Cup Qualifiers and its women's team for the AFC Women's Asian Cup qualification matches.

For the first time, six Eurasian footballers

– Harhys Stewart, Jared Gallagher,
Jacob Mahler, Ryhan Stewart and Zikos
Chua – were called up to the Young
Lions squad, while Lila Tan received her
first call-up to the women's team.

During the men's Under-23 Asian Cup Qualifiers held in Singapore last October, the Young Lions put on a credible performance in front of home fans as they took on Philippines, Timor-Leste and defending champions South Korea. The Young Lions finished second in the qualifying group behind favourites South Korea, who went on to book their place in the finals to be held in Uzbekistan in June.

Young Lions skipper Jacob Mahler, who signed his first professional football contract three years ago with the Young Lions to play in the Singapore Premier

League (SPL), told The NewEurasian that it was a priceless experience playing in an international tournament. "It's an amazing feeling to be putting on the national jersey and representing the country. For me, it's an honour and something I will never trade anything for," said the 21-year-old, who is currently serving his national service.

Siblings Harhys and Ryhan Stewart, whose mum is Singaporean Malay-Chinese and dad from Wales, shared that it was a proud moment for their family to see them represent the national team. Said Harhys, who is waiting for his national service enlistment, "It was my first time playing with the Under-23 national team and it was a huge privilege and honour."

"I was nervous at the start but I felt that I slowly grew into the tournament. I'm looking forward to putting on the national team kit again soon! Playing against countries in the region was tough but it was a great challenge. I believe our team did well to finish second in the group and we're looking to improve in future tournaments," added the midfielder who supports Liverpool Football Club.

Older brother Ryhan agreed. "It's a big achievement and it was a great experience playing against South Korea, the current Asian champions. Personally, I feel the team did well and we gave our all," said the defender, who has also played for SPL clubs Warriors FC and Tampines Rovers FC.

For 19-year-old Jared Gallagher, whose mum is Singaporean Chinese and dad Irish, being Eurasian and representing the country of his birth gave him immense pride, and it meant fighting for the flag while donning the national jersey.

"It was very challenging and eyeopening for me as it was my first time

playing international football at any age group. But I relished the experience and thought the home support was terrific! Our fans did a great job in creating a thrilling matchday atmosphere for my teammates and me," said the midfielder who relocated when he was nine-years-old after his parents were deployed overseas for work, before returning in 2020 to serve his national service.

Zikos Chua, whose mum is Greek, and dad Singaporean Chinese, felt very much at home with his Eurasian team mates playing alongside him. "It is an immense honour to don the national jersey. It is even more so given my Eurasian heritage as it is a very small community here and it is good to see many Eurasians representing Singapore, especially in football," said the 19-year-old who was born in a town called Kastoria in northwestern Macedonia.

Turning his attention to the AFC Under-23 Asian Cup Qualifiers, Zikos, who became the youngest SPL player (17 years and 102 days) to score five goals in 2019, felt playing at the highest level with top quality opponents could

help him and the team improve their game. "The games were of extremely high intensity from the first whistle, and you could see what it meant for everyone involved. At that level, every little mistake counts, so it was an incredible experience and one that I'm sure will make me as well as my teammates better players," said the striker.

Also making the news headlines last year was the national women's team who were playing in the AFC Women's Asian Cup Qualifiers in Tajikistan, with 18-year-old Lila Tan making her debut against Indonesia.

Lila, whose mum is French and dad Singaporean Chinese, recalled how she felt before taking to the pitch. "It was an insane experience, one that I am still in awe of. I think one of the greatest things of being away with the team was the bond I have created with my teammates. I would do it all over again!"

Reflecting on her debut performance, Lila, who also juggles school, modelling gigs and football with the Lion City Sailors FC said, "There's always room for improvement and I believe there's a lot to learn from. But I am immensely appreciative to be able to play in the second game. I truly gave it my all; including giving away a lot of fouls as I was hungry for the ball. I am happy with my teammates' performances, and I believe we redeemed ourselves in the second match. However, I don't think we displayed our full potential as I know what we are capable of and it's sad that we could not show it on the pitch."

If there is one thing for sure, the young Eurasian footballers shared a common sentiment throughout their sporting experience, which Lila succinctly summed up, "It's a beautiful thing to be Eurasian and having the great privilege to have my country's flag on my jersey."

Why football?

Harhys: I've been playing football with my brother and dad in our backyard since I was three or four-years-old. My family was always very active and encouraged us to play whichever sports we liked, and it just so happened that my brother and I really enjoyed and loved playing football. I also played other sports while I was growing up like basketball, rugby, cricket, and table tennis with friends or at school.

Ryhan: I remember playing football with my brother and dad since I was around four or five-years-old. I played other sports such as rugby and cricket, but I chose football as my main sport. I have played for Warriors FC, Tampines Rovers FC, and Young Lions FC in the SPL.

Zikos: I've been playing football for about 14 years now. I started when I was in kindergarten back in Greece. I would play football with my friends during recess using a metal gate as our goal. I'm not quite sure how I got interested in the sport, but my parents told me when I was younger, they'd just give me a ball and I'd kick it about around the house. I think it also helped that my grandfather built a small futsal field next to his house back in Greece, which probably intensified my interest in it as I'd spend a huge chunk of my days playing against my brother in that little pitch.

Jared: I started playing football when I moved overseas to Shanghai. All my classmates in school played it so I joined in and fell in love with football immediately. I also played basketball and volleyball in school, but I just loved watching football and trying to emulate the stuff I saw on TV, so I kept playing as I grew older.

Jacob: I started playing football at the age of seven and I've never looked back. My love for the game keeps growing every day. My passion comes from my father, who I caught watching football one night when I was young and I have been intrigued by the game ever since. I never did any other sports seriously as my passion for football made me stick with the sport.

Could you share with us your **Eurasian heritage?**

Harhys: My mum is Singaporean Malay-Chinese and dad is Welsh. I am often mistaken for a foreigner, but I don't mind, I'm used to it. I can speak a little Malay and sometimes, I surprise my teammates when I speak or understand what they say. I've been listening to a lot of Malay music recently!

Ryhan: My dad is Welsh while my mum is Singaporean Malay-Chinese. I have been mistaken often for not being Singaporean as I look very 'angmo'.

Zikos: My mother is Greek and dad is Singaporean-Chinese. I am commonly mistaken as a foreigner whenever I meet people as they think I'm a bit different compared other Chinese. Taxi drivers will always ask if I am local to confirm their suspicion.

Jared: My dad is Irish while mum is Singaporean-Chinese, but I don't think I look like either of them. I've been mistaken to be Filipino many times. I suppose it's because I'm quite tan.

Future plans in football?

Harhys: I want to try and play overseas after my NS. It will be challenging, but I believe in myself and I will work hard to be the best version of myself and play overseas. I also want to represent the senior national team and help the national football scene grow and improve.

Ryhan: My aim has always been to play overseas after serving NS.

Zikos: My goals for the near future are to perform well in this year's SPL with the Young Lions and try to get myself in the national 'A' team. From there on, it is definitely an aspiration of mine to play football overseas in the near future.

Jared:: I'm looking to further my studies in addition to continuing to play football, so I'm opened to opportunities overseas and locally.

Jacob: To complete NS and venture overseas to play and become a better player, hopefully in Europe.

Like the saying that good things come in pairs, September was a month of double celebration for 18-year-old Lila Tan.

She was named one of the Miss Universe Singapore 2021 finalists, before being called up to the women's national team for two Asian Football Confederation (AFC) Women's Asian Cup qualification matches in Tajikistan.

Speaking to The NewEurasian, she shared that juggling football and modelling is challenging. "It is something that I am still in the midst of overcoming. I try to list out my priorities and fixate on them."

However, for Lila, who lived in Shanghai for 14 years after her French mum and Singaporean dad relocated there due to work, it seems that football has an edge over modelling as she charts out her plan after her debut against Indonesia.

"I would love to pursue football at a professional level! The next step would be to play at a high level in university overseas," she shared before adding what she needed to do to improve her game. "I need to learn how to read the game better so I can make better runs both with and without the ball."

Women's national team skipper Ernie Sulastri shared that Lila has the potential to do well, as long as she continues to work hard to improve her game.

"I thought she did well for her debut. During the match, she managed to adapt well despite feeling nervous which was understandable especially when she was playing her first match," said Ernie.

"I hope Lila overcomes any fear and have confidence in herself, and play every match like it was her last," she added.

Off the pitch, Lila's works out at the gym regularly to improve her strength and conditioning, and while her fitness regime may seem daunting to some, she stresses the importance of finding the right balance between work and play.

"For my mental health, I like to take time off to focus my energy back to myself and listen to my body. I like to read inspirational and motivational quotes and implement them in my life."

Dr Puthucheary added, "We will have to try to educate and bring everybody along on this journey."

Getting to know our Outstanding Contribution Award recipients

Tara Maria Davenport, 41, Assistant Professor, Faculty of Law, NUS [Daughter of the late Bryan Davenport]

"I am very grateful to the EA for recognising my father's contributions. The ceremony was lovely and I was especially touched to see the video outlining his contributions. It means so much to us as a family as the work that my father did at the EA was one of the great pleasures of his life and the achievement he was most proud of.

I remember attending so many EA functions where my father would give speeches and talk to everyone and would be the life of the party. We always had so much fun as a family at the New Year's Eve dances. I also remember visiting my dad at the EA after school where he would always be very engaged in helping the Eurasian community. I think he made a significant difference with his efforts and played an important role in highlighting the importance of the Eurasian community in Singapore."

John Francis Pereira, 29, Accountant [Son of the late Barry Pereira]

"My father never ceases to inspire me. His impact is enduring and life-changing. When we were little, my father would bring us to the former EA house at Mountbatten Road on Saturday mornings to help pack rations for the less resourced. Together with Aunty Lena Fox, it would be a morning filled with fun as we helped put the rations in bags according to Aunty Lena's instructions. Sometimes, we would go with him to the homes. I remember my father always chatting and laughing with the families. Although the bags were heavy and there was a lot of walking to do, my father was always cheery and the families welcoming and warm. He lived his life making the lives of others better."

Edmund Rodrigues, 80, Retired teacher

"I truly feel elated and proud. There are really two separate contributions which stand out in my memory. The first initiative - a 'Free Math Revision course' for "O" level candidates was initiated during the tenure of the late EA President Brian Davenport. Mrs. Ursula Quah, the Education Chairperson then had asked me if I could conduct this class and I went on to do so for about 10 weeks from the September school holidays. The take up rate was very positive with about 20 students. The sessions were held in the main hall of the Mountbatten Road premises and at times, at the nearby community centres. Although the cohort was generally weak in ability, there was a revival of interest in the subject and with a new approach to the teaching of the subject, quite a number went on to pass the subject for the first time. It was very touching to get to meet the students again after the results were released and to hear their wonderful reactions.

The second contribution which I feel has made a difference to the community was the 'Home Improvement Scheme'. This scheme was the brainchild of a benevolent corporate donor who gave us a donation to improve the lives of the financially challenged families in our community. With the help of our hard-working social worker, Ram and Quentin Pereira, we did a visual inspection of the homes occupied by these families. We were not only moved but sometimes shocked by the state of neglect in some homes. We also discovered some of the underlying causes for the poor academic performance of some children coming from such homes. With consent from the committee, we 'upgraded' the project from a basic 'repainting' event to a home improvement, to improve the home aesthetically and its 'environment' to being more conducive for individual members of the family. Today, the project is about 70% complete before being put on hold due to the current pandemic."

Valerie Scully, 80, Housewife

"I have been volunteering at the EA for 30 years and was not expecting any accolades, so this award came as a pleasant surprise and I'm delighted. The most memorable contribution I have achieved with the EA is the formation of the EA Song and Dance Troupe. Being able to share with fellow Singaporeans the rich Eurasian culture through cultural talks, song and dance. I hope the EA will continue to grow and be able to support the less fortunate in our community in welfare and education as well as preserving our vibrant Eurasian culture."







Benett Theseira, 56, Managing Director and Head of Asia-Pacific, PGIM Real Estate

"It is a great honour to have been able to serve the Eurasian community and to receive this award. More so when I look at the other 5 recipients, who have all done so much for the EA and the Eurasian community. I feel humbled to be considered alongside them and very appreciative of the EA for according me with this award. During my time serving on the EA MC, initially as Treasurer and subsequently as Vice President and President, my focus was always to make EA a better organisation - in our finances and governance, our service focus and in our engagement with the broader community and the government. Perhaps the most tangible contribution I have made was to work on the launch of the Eurasian Community Fund while I was Treasurer, and subsequently while I was President to secure approval to raise the contribution rates and the government matching grant. Both of these have provided the EA with a sound financial footing and the capacity to run its community programmes over the last 25 years and for many more years to come. The Eurasian community and the EA are relatively small but have made very significant contributions to the community and Singapore, disproportionate to our small size. This was only possible because many Eurasians came together to support each other and the nation, and to make a difference. For me, the journey started with a small step, to help where I thought I could, which led to bigger opportunities, responsibilities and contributions. My hope is that more Eurasians, especially the younger ones, will come together to help EA and the community. It is only by working together that we can help to continue uplifting the community and to keep it vibrant."


