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
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Congratulations!

SINGAPORE WRITERS FESTIVAL 2019

Honouring Rex Shelley

Singapore Writers Festival honoured author Rex Shelley as the Literary Pioneer for 2019. The Arts House also held an exhibition on the life of the late Mr Shelley, best known for his award-winning quartet of stories, which includes *The Shrimp People*. Titled The Gentle Observer, the exhibition delved into his life as author, father and Singapore Eurasian, covering aspects such as his literary influences, love for Japanese culture, music, silk painting and favourite food, among other interests.

The last chapter of the exhibition booklet titled *Why He Wrote* outlines Shelley's belief that it was vital for these stories to be told as part of Singapore's historical narrative, especially for Eurasians. For example, the story of Bahau (mentioned in *People of the Pear Tree*) may be familiar to Eurasians, but Shelley wanted not just Eurasians but all Singaporeans to know and understand it. One of his aims for writing these books was to put on record the Eurasian community's way of life and their way of thinking.

Lyle Cordeiro on the SAFTEA Football Tournament

EA Men's Soccer Team Singapore took part in the **Selangor and Federal Territory Eurasian Association (SAFTEA)** Football Tournament in Kuala Lumpur in November 2019.

In Game 1, our Soccer Team 2 was eliminated by Penang EA in a 3 to 0 score line. In Game 2, our Soccer Team 1 drew a score of 1 to 1 against SAFTEA but was eliminated during penalty shootouts. Penang EA went home with the Trophy when they defeated SAFTEA in the finals.

Here, Men's Soccer Team member Lyle Cordeiro talks about his experience at the SAFTEA Football Tournament.

In three words, Lyle, how would you describe our EA Men's Soccer Team's experience during this SAFTEA Tournament?

Bonding, community-building, camaraderie.

What was the camaraderie like playing with other Eurasian teams?

Our members have already been encouraged by the overwhelming number of Eurasian males (veterans and youth) coming together to form our EA men's soccer squad to represent Singapore Eurasians in Singapore. It was even more encouraging and exhilarating for us to be further joined by our brethren from two Malaysian states. The tournament was played in the spirit of brotherhood, yet at a competitive standard.

Besides the tournament, what did you guys get up to?

Other than attending the Match Day and Fellowship Dinner as a community, the 29 players and accompanying 27 supporters of mostly family members spent much of the weekend enjoying great food and entertainment in the Brickfields area. There was a lot of similar bonding during our trip together between Singapore and Kuala Lumpur. I would comfortably say that the Singapore delegation was the most vocal and assertive during the SAFTEA Centennial Football Tournament formalities.

Are you looking to expand our current soccer team? If so, what are the requirements and when are the practices?

We now have 89 players registered, of which 66 are moderate-to-very active, playing regularly together weekly and bi-weekly during friendly matches.

What are the EA Men's Soccer Team's goals for 2020?

Our initiative continues to grow and we endeavour to start building our youth sub-squad. This year, we aim to organise training sessions among the squad even when there are no friendly games scheduled. Included in our bucket list is securing a home ground.

Said Edmund: "FSS Team 2019 was an extraordinary team! Now to look forward to 2020, the first year of EA's road to its Bicentennial with renewed vigour, and to carry out a full agenda with the support of this dedicated committee.



We are FSS

Family Support Services (FSS) provides assistance and guidance to Eurasians from underprivileged backgrounds, especially the elderly and families at risk. The welfare branch of the Eurasian Association, FSS is the brainchild of EA's former president, the

late Bryan Davenport. Mr Davenport placed utmost importance on serving the community and the underprivileged among them, especially those experiencing financial difficulties.

Through various programmes and funds, the FSS helps the Eurasian community manage life's difficult and unforeseen circumstances. FSS initiatives aim to build self-confidence in beneficiaries so they can overcome such obstacles. Friends of the FSS, who are volunteers, deliver monthly food rations and basic necessities to identified homes.

Here, two volunteers, Ms Christine Pereira and Mr Misha Monteiro, tell us how their FSS journey began and what their responsibilities are.



When did you start volunteering with the FSS team and what motivated you to join them?

CHRISTINE: I started volunteering in 2010, took a break in 2015, but returned in 2017 when FSS came under the very capable chairmanship of Edmund Rodrigues. I retired from the workforce in 2010 and was looking at various charities where I could lend a helping hand, and what better organisation than our EA!

MISHA: I joined FSS in 2016 shortly after Edmund Rodrigues assumed the FSS Chair. I attended his first committee meeting after receiving an email from him and our case worker Ram explaining the purpose of the FSS and its goals to support the less fortunate in our community. Until then, I was not even aware that the EA participated in social welfare. I am happy to say I have been actively involved in FSS ever since that first meeting.

Describe a memorable experience as a volunteer.

CHRISTINE: Every time our FSS clients have a smile on their faces during the events and lunches that we organise for them!

MISHA: There have been many but the very first meeting calls for a special mention. Despite me being the youngest one present, Edmund was open and keen to listen to my suggestion of overhauling our Befrienders Programme to bring it more in line with other Voluntary Welfare Organisations (VWOs). I was given the task of writing a White Paper outlining the general purpose of the Befrienders, its specific context to our community and the feasibility of several programmes of reform. After a process of consultation and research, I am glad my final proposal was accepted and adopted by the committee. It is now in the hands of a more experienced committee member, namely Martha Fernandez, to implement it.

That journey of contributing to the policy of our FSS held invaluable learning points and was an experience not many

young people would have had available to them. To me, the FSS under Edmund is an endeavour where youth and their ideas are encouraged and fostered in our objective to build a growing, ever more capable FSS focused on delivering the best support for the underprivileged in our community. With our framework of rendering all possible aid on the basis of 'need not want', the FSS works tirelessly to achieve its motto. No One Left Behind.

What have you learned about the underprivileged in our Eurasian community since joining FSS?

CHRISTINE: To be honest, there are more underprivileged Eurasians than we think. And the reason we are unable to reach out and assist all of them is because they are hesitant to come forward, not wanting others to know about their plight. I would personally like to tell everyone in need who comes forward that our FSS team will treat them with utmost respect and dignity, and will handle every situation with confidentiality.

MISHA: The circumstances facing the underprivileged are generally diverse and unique in each individual case. And while

no one wants to find themselves in need, circumstances are sometimes beyond their control. That's why it's so important that everyone in the community bands together. It's also vital that the organisation responsible for administering support does so with the long-term goal of helping each beneficiary of aid to work towards being self-reliant wherever possible.

Another thing I have learned in my time with the FSS is that many individuals from other communities are unaware

that there are Eurasians in need. The misconception that all members of our community are well off is pervasive. So, even more so now, Eurasians need to band together to show support for our underprivileged lest they be forgotten by the wider society.


What are your goals for our FSS team for 2020?

CHRISTINE: My personal goal is to contribute effectively to the Befrienders Programme. We hope to recruit more volunteers to fulfil its intent, whereby we will increase visits to our FSS clients, spend more quality time with them and basically be a friend to them. We are presently working on a surprise item in tandem with the Befrienders Programme, which will be revealed in the April–June issue of *The New Eurasian*!

MISHA: Ever since Ed took the Chair and assembled his team, FSS has embarked on a phased programme of reform and expansion to better meet the changing needs of our community. It's my great honour to be a part of that journey.

In 2020, I see the FSS focusing its energies on more, new initiatives and the formal roll-out of a new sustainable Befrienders group. In addition to supplementing our community outreach with new ideas and working harder than ever before in community building, the FSS will also become more accountable to our donors, supporters and beneficiaries of aid. The implementation of Protocols for our Case Review (CARE) Team has been my most recent goal. It will ensure an equitable and universal standard of care, regardless of who sits on the committee.

Shawn _____ Dillon Siew

Shawn Dillion Siew, a Eurasian-Chinese, was diagnosed with autism 16 years ago when he was slightly more than three years old. Now almost 20, he indulges in hobbies such as football (he is a fan of Manchester United) and music (he's learning a few musical instruments). Shawn has not let autism get in his way at all. He recently won four awards: Outstanding Trainee in General Vocation & Office Skills (Middle); Outstanding Award in Mathematics (Functional); Outstanding Trainee in Baking (Intermediate); and Best in Information Technology (IT). We quizzed him about his accomplishments and motivation.

Shawn, you have won multiple awards. Congratulations! Tell us, what do you plan next?

I want to continue studying in Pathlight School for three more years in the Vocational Track Senior Years Programme and earn an NITEC (National ITE* Certificate) or WSQ (Workforce Skills Qualifications). I worked very hard to qualify for the Vocational Track Senior Years programme and made every effort to check my work, and I was blessed with these four awards.

What is people's main misunderstanding of you and autism?

Many people have wondered why I do not speak Mandarin even though my dad is Chinese. I get very frustrated because I cannot speak the language. People often forget that people with autism may struggle with learning a language as well,

which is a secondary deficit. The primary deficits of autism are communication and social deficits.

Where do you see yourself in 10 years?

I hope to be working in an autism-friendly worksite that Pathlight School eventually posts me to. I want to earn an income. I also hope to receive support from job coaches so that I will not be stressed out by my work and have meltdowns.

Do you have any words of encouragement to share with other Eurasian youth who may have learning difficulties?

My favourite quote is "God doesn't require us to succeed, he only requires that you try," by Saint Mother Teresa. It is important to never give up and to keep trying!

Ethan's Love for Soccer

Ethan Henry Pinto is a Singapore Sports School Student and National Footballer who is currently preparing for the Asian Football Confederation in Hong Kong. We ask him about his journey and love of the game.



Nathan, tell us... when did you begin playing football?

I was introduced to football and was taught to play the game at the tender age of five by my older brother Antonio. He brought me along to play with his friends almost every day. My supportive parents enrolled me in a private football academy when they saw my intense interest in the sport. My whole family loves football.

Which football player did you look up to before you started playing professionally?

When I was young, I used to enjoy watching Cristiano Ronaldo and Messi, and tried to copy whatever they did on the pitch. But these past two years, the person I have come to respect and look up to is my sports school coach, ex-national player Isa Halim. He is always motivating and pushing us during training and in games. I lost the drive to play competitive football in early 2018. This changed when Isa took over the coaching of our sports school team. He made me realise my full playing potential.

What are some pros and cons about playing football in Singapore?

It's a great time to be a youth footballer in Singapore as I believe our country is trying to push our standards to a higher level and more resources will be poured in to groom the youths.

The challenging part is balancing full-time training with studies. In the national setup, we are required to train at least six times a week as a team. Because I am in Sports School, it is slightly easier to manage both, as our school's environment is more suited to student athletes, and classes are customised especially during tournament season.

Which overseas team do you aspire to play for?

For me, the ultimate dream is to play for any club in Europe, but if I had a choice it would be Liverpool. I am a big fan!

What advice would you give other young Eurasians who are keen to play professionally?

Train and work hard on the field. Always give your best in a game. Never lose hope.

What's it like balancing football training, studying and being a youth in Singapore?

It's tough at times, having to be in a competitive mindset almost 11 months in a year. I am involved in both international and local competitions during this period, so I need to put in extra effort to catch up in the classroom. As with all team sports, we need to constantly train together, almost every day, to gel as a unit which in turn affects our own social life. For the sake of football, we often sacrifice spending time with friends, taking holidays with family and just living like a normal teenager. But all this becomes worth it when I get a chance to represent Singapore.

Where do you see yourself professionally in five years?

Within these five years, I will work very hard – improving my ability on the pitch, building myself up physically and mentally – to earn a call-up from the Singapore U22 squad or our senior national team. I hope to complete my studies and NS, so as to be free for trials overseas if and when the opportunity arises.

EA has its own football team. Would you like to share some words of encouragement with them?

All in, the EA team mates look great. I have been following them on Facebook, my father has a few friends in the team. I would say it's the true spirit of football, bringing everyone together and having fun no matter the age or skill set. I sincerely hope to join them in a kickabout one day if they would have me.

Meet Phyllis Perreau, she turns 101 this year

At the Eurasian Festival on 27 July 2019, the Eurasian community was curious to know who the elegant woman on stage with Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong was. When told that she was 100, they could hardly believe it. She looked amazing for her age!

Phyllis Clara Perreau was born on 18 October 1919 in Sri Aman (formerly Simanggang), Sarawak, East Malaysia. Her parents Martin and Gertrude Nanang were native Ibans – her father was one of the first Ibans to be ordained as an Anglican Minister.

When she turned 10, Phyllis boarded and was educated at St Mary's Anglican School in Kuching. She showed academic excellence and could have become a doctor except that it would have burdened the family financially. She decided to become a nurse instead. She jokes that she had admired a nurse in her white crisp uniform and wanted to look as smart as she did.

At 17, Phyllis was selected to train at Kuching General Hospital, but the English missionaries suggested that she be sent to Singapore to undergo formal training at St Andrew's Mission Hospital. The rest, as they say, is history.

74 years of experience in the medical industry

Phyllis did her training at St Andrews Mission Hospital from 1936 to 1939. On graduating, she joined Middleton Hospital, now known as the Communicable Disease Centre. Her career was interrupted when the war broke out in 1942. Hospital staff were given a form of severance allowance before they all dispersed. Phyllis, having also procured her midwifery licence during training, delivered babies in the kampungs to bring in an income. When the war ended, she resumed her nursing at Middleton Hospital before retiring at the age of 55 in 1974.

Phyllis took on various casual jobs at off-site dispensaries till a job offer at St John's Home for Elderly Persons presented itself in 1979. She became their Matron until 2002, when she turned 83. After chalking up 66 years of service as a paid healthcare professional, she became a volunteer with the Home Life Sub-Committee in 2002 and the Home's Management Committee from 2004 to 2010. These appointments added another eight years to make up a total of 74 years in the medical industry.

Phyllis recalls her early days at Middleton Hospital when epidemics such as diphtheria and cholera broke out, and vaccines were not readily available. She remembers diphtheria patients, mainly children, having to undergo emergency tracheotomy. She also recalls how quickly bedpans filled up during the cholera outbreak and how fast they had to be replaced because patients were being admitted non-stop. Typhoid, polio, smallpox, chickenpox and dysentery would often break out at the same time.

Whilst memories of those difficult times remain, she experienced immeasurable joy and satisfaction seeing her patients recover, sometimes even after only two intravenous injections. Faced with limited resources, the staff had to work very hard.

In the early days, treatment was limited. Mortality rates were high despite Penicillin being available for smallpox. Phyllis is happy that advances in science and research have made possible a wide range of vaccines and antibiotics today.

These medical advances – together with education on the causes and prevention of diseases, the encouragement of good hygiene practices and healthier drinking water – reduced sickness and increased life expectancy. Phyllis adds that a person's life expectancy is so much better now than during her time.

For anyone aspiring to be in the medical industry, Phyllis advises them to stay focused and work hard. Be confident. Do not turn down opportunities that come your way. Be honest in your work and considerate of others. And be the best you possibly can.

Love and marriage

Phyllis was brought up in a Christian home. Her father was an ordained Anglican Minister after all, and coming from a strict Christian family, it was expected that she regularly attend church, that being St Andrew's Cathedral. She met her husband-to-be,

Daniel Chamberlain Perreau, at the Cathedral, where he was a server. They dated for a while, became engaged in 1940 and married on 31 January 1942. During their wedding service at the

Cathedral, there was a Japanese bombing sortie on Singapore but fortunately the Cathedral was not hit.

Adapting to the Eurasian way of life

SOCIALISING Phyllis was introduced to his siblings and his many Eurasian friends, like Charles and Mary Richards, who welcomed her into their fold. This being the 1940s, like all women then, Phyllis was reserved at first but learned to mingle comfortably with both sexes. She soon came out of her shell.

COOKING Eurasians always pride themselves on their culinary skills. Chamberlain made a very smooth sambal belachan, crushing chillies with gusto. He taught Phyllis to make delicious blancmange and bread pudding using stale bread slices, milk and raisins. During a radio interview in 1985, Phyllis credited him for introducing her to different Eurasian and European foods.

DANCING Chamberlain was a good dancer and he taught her the waltz and foxtrot. They often went to the Singapore Recreation Club where they danced and socialised.


SPORT Eurasians enjoy camaraderie in sport. Phyllis never really engaged in any form of sport, but she supported Chamberlain who was not only an athlete and golfer, but also a keen marksman. She would accompany him to the rifle range whenever there were competitions. His shooting skills took him to the jungles of Mandai and Seletar where there were *kluang* (flying foxes) and he would usually bring one or two home. Phyllis remembers making Devil Curry with flying fox meat.

ENTERTAINING Entertaining friends in the home was a big thing, which Phyllis grew accustomed to. There was always lots of sumptuous food served buffet style with lots to drink – beer, punch and so on. The evening always ended with a jam session. Someone with a guitar or ukelele would entertain.

What does she see for Eurasians in the year ahead?

"Our presence in Singapore might diminish, but our traditions will still live on through our religion, foods, sport and music. Despite intermarriage with other ethnic groups and the influence of their customs, our Eurasian traditions are maintained and are readily embraced in turn by those we marry. Eurasians should continue to work hard, contribute to society, be proud of themselves and ensure they hold their place in Singapore."

Farleigh's Game

Farleigh Clarke comes from a pedigree of hockey stalwarts; his father Andrew and Uncle Gerard were among the who's who sportsmen in the Eurasian Association (EA) and Singapore Recreation Club (SRC). Andrew joined the SRC in 1937 and despite the Japanese Occupation went on to represent the Club in both soccer and hockey, growing these two sports communities locally. Gerard was still a member of the SRC at the age of 99.

It was this environment and the avid hockey programmes at St Joseph's Institution (SJI) that propelled Farleigh, described by newspapers as the "dashing forward" and "hockey maestro", to national acclaim. He played for inter-school leagues, under-23 tournaments and the SRC. But it was during National Service, where he played for SAFSA, that he could dedicate all his time and effort to fully-immersive hockey training. Those two years would hone his sportsmanship to an international level.

Throughout the 1960s and '70s, the name Farleigh Clarke became synonymous with Singapore hockey. He was admired for his tenacity – he would enter the field in a crisp clean uniform and be the last to leave the pitch, his uniform completely soiled.

Named Singapore's All-time Best Eleven by The Straits Times, Farleigh represented Singapore in four SEA Games (SEAP Games

then), winning Gold in 1973 as the Most Valuable Player of that season. All other SEA Games forays netted a silver for Team Singapore, with Farleigh on the team.

Farleigh represented Singapore in the Asian Games, MHF Razak Cup Tournament and various international matches against Malaysia, Australia, New Zealand, India, Belgium and France, to name a few. Sports journalists marvelled at his deft stickwork that played with angles and deflections to score goals. They would also lament that, to date, Team Singapore has yet to produce a similar talent in local hockey.

Farleigh has not hung his boots up yet; he still tours and represents Singapore in veteran leagues. These days, he is a hockey coach, actively following his father's footsteps and grooming the young generation of Singapore's hockey talent in junior colleges, primary schools, and secondary schools such as CHIJ St Teresa's Convent and his alma mater SJI.

Passionately believing that the key to Team Singapore's hockey excellence lies in committed resources provided to young hockey players, Farleigh can be found on hockey pitches around the island motivating and inspiring the next generation of Singapore's hockey gold medallists. – *Margaret D'Cruz*
